



**President's Message**

Most of our readers might not know of the Memorial Garden that is located on the grounds of Animal Care Services. Friends of Long Beach Animals started the Memorial Garden to honor all of the shelter mascots who have passed.

The garden has morphed into many different styles through the years. It was once a Koi Pond, had a fountain and, through the ravages of time, had garnered some much needed work and updating. Thankfully, this all happened with the aid of the participants of Make A Difference Day. FOLBA took on the expense of the plants and had a couple of the Memorial Stones redone. A grateful "Thank You" to Val at Ocean Stained Glass in Seal Beach for refurbishing the Memorial Plaques. (See page 6 for the photos of Worf's)

Two of the mascots resided at the old shelter on Willow Street. There was Amy, a Shepherd-St. Bernard-mix dog and Puff, the cat, who hung out in the business office. Before that shelter was closed and the employees and critters became residents of the Companion Animal Village (spcaLA-Animal Control), a Rottweiler puppy was abandoned at the shelter with thoughts that the pup was dying.

The Veterinarian staff at the time determined he was suffering from acute flea spray overdose. He was then bathed and, within a short time, he healed and was then a normal Rottweiler pup. Animal Control tried to locate the previous owner. When no one stepped forward, he became the 3rd official mascot and the staff named him Worf. Worf was also transported to the brand new Companion Animal Village and remained the mascot for quite a few years. Worf passed away due to the usual old age ailments. A beautiful picture of him remains in the office.

Bear, a pit bull mix, became the next mascot. Bear was confiscated in a Cruelty-to-Animals case. ACS won the case and Bear was not to go back to the owner. Bear became the 4th mascot but succumbed early in his life due to his past treatment. During the time Bear was a resident, he gave the staff much love and the staff loved him beyond anything he could have ever wished. Tippy, the three-legged dog, is still alive and doing well with an ACS staff member.

Stop by the Companion Animal Village and honor the ACS mascots at the new Memorial Garden and, while you are there, you might find a new forever friend that is looking just for you.

Next month I will be nine years old, and my parents are going to get me a dog for my birthday. Where do you think they should look for a dog for me? At a pet store maybe? Or a breeder? Or where?

Dear Annabelle,

The answer to your question is very easy. Your parents should adopt a dog from an animal shelter. There are a bunch of good reasons for this. First, they will be saving a life! The animals in shelters were given up, or abandoned or lost, and they are unwanted and helpless. By adopting one of them, you are giving it a new life in a loving home.

By adopting from a shelter, you are also helping to break the cycle of pet overpopulation. It's very sad, but there aren't enough homes for all the animals that are born. Each year, 8 to 12 million dogs and cats are euthanized because there aren't enough homes for them, and that's a terrible thing.

Also, people who work at shelters work with animals every day, and have a wealth of information which they are always willing to share with you, so you will get a lifetime resource on any issues you may have with your pet. And the staff of the shelters will have given the dog you adopt very good care, assisted by vet partners that come on a regular basis and ensure that the animals receive good care.

One last thing: adopting from a shelter is what I call a win-win situation: You get to choose a dog from a great selection, you pay less, you encourage others to adopt animals from shelter and help to save more lives, and you are supporting a valuable charity and community institution.

So Annabelle, it's really what you kids call a no-brainer. Go with your parents to your local animal shelter and pick out your birthday dog. My only warning is that it will be hard to choose, because you'll fall in love with more than one dog.

Big News: FBI Collecting Data on Crimes Against Animals



A first look at the FBI's animal cruelty statistics will be available next year, but it will take three to five years for the data to begin showing helpful patterns.

Acts of cruelty against animals are now counted alongside felony crimes like arson, burglary, assault, and homicide in the FBI's expansive criminal database.

On January 1, the Bureau's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) began collecting detailed data from participating law enforcement agencies on acts of animal cruelty, including gross neglect, torture, organized abuse, and sexual abuse. Before this year, crimes that involved animals were lumped into an "All Other Offenses" category in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's annual *Crime in the United States* report, a survey of crime data provided by about 18,000 city, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies.

By adding animal cruelty offenses to NIBRS, law enforcement agencies and the advocacy groups that pushed for the inclusion in the FBI database are hoping the results will reveal a more complete picture of the nature of cruelty to animals.

The National Sheriffs' Association was a leading advocate for adding animal cruelty as a data set in the Bureau's collection of crime statistics. The association for years has cited studies linking animal abuse and other types of crimes - most famously, murders committed by serial killers like Ted Bundy, Jeffrey Dahmer, and the "Son of Sam" killer David Berkowitz. The organization also points out the overlap animal abuse has with domestic violence and child abuse.

"If somebody is harming an animal, there is a good chance they also are hurting a human," said John Thompson, deputy executive director of the National Sheriffs' Association. "If we see patterns of animal abuse, the odds are that something else is going on."

A first look at NIBRS animal cruelty statistics will be available next year, but it will take at least three to five years for the data to begin showing helpful patterns.

Groups that advocated for the new animal cruelty data hope that by adding it to NIBRS - rather than the summary-based statistics agencies provide the Bureau each year - they will get a much richer data set from which to mine.

That's because NIBRS requires participating agencies not only to report crimes but also all the circumstances of a crime. Additionally, the Bureau plans to phase out summary-based UCR statistics—which have been collected roughly the same way since 1930 - in favor of NIBRS by 2021.

Those who lobbied for better animal abuse data would agree. "With this information, law enforcement and victim services would be able to better target their intervention efforts with respect to both animal cruelty and those crimes for which animal cruelty serves as a marker," said Dr. Mary Lou Randour of the Animal Welfare Institute, which worked closely with the National Sheriffs' Association to advance their cause. "Identifying and analyzing animal cruelty crimes would provide an important tool for law enforcement."

The National Sheriffs' Association's John Thompson urged people to shed the mindset that animal cruelty is a crime only against animals. "It's a crime against society," he said, urging all law enforcement agencies to participate in NIBRS. "By paying attention to [these crimes], we are benefiting all of society."


This unique idea was successful for both the students and FOLBA. Students went home with some great prizes that the group had gathered.


